that they had giving up their fear of being grabbed by the Jews and Romans. Peter declared he was going fishing. He didn't really know what to do, so he went back to something familiar. They had not caught any fish. In the Gospels we never see them catch fish without the intervention of Jesus. They didn't realize it was Jesus, one wonders if they didn't recognize Him because of His Resurrected body, or if something else was afoot. (No one seems to immediately recognize Jesus after His Resurrection. They recognized Him by the miracles.) John recognized Jesus, and for some reason Peter jumped into the water to go see Jesus. The transformation of Peter, is shown here and was ongoing. He started as a fisherman, and was transformed into a fisher-of-men.

THEME OF THE DAY:

Changed to Serve

INTROIT—(Antiphon: Psalm 145:10;) Psalm 145:4-7, 9

Psalm 145 is a Psalm of David written to praise God. It is an acrostic, each line begins with the next of the 22 letters of the Hebrew Alphabet. (Others are 37, 111, 112 with Psalm 119 as the largest example of an acrostic in that each section begins with the succeeding letter.) It is taught that Psalm 145 was David's favorite. The letter "nun" is missing in most manuscripts. In the ESV a verse that shows up between 13 and 14 begins with "nun." It is found in the Septuagint (the ancient Greek Bible.)

COLLECT

Jesus was born into our humanity and by that work lifted up our flesh in glory before God. We ask for the ability to show forth the joy that has come to us for all He has done.

FIRST LESSON—Acts 9:1-22

Paul's persecution of Jesus' followers went back to Good Friday when some of the people of Jerusalem and members of the Council stood before Pilate and cried out, "Crucify Him!" Council members told Pilate he could not be a friend of Caesar if he released Jesus. In Philippians, we are told that Paul was taught by Gamaliel, and that he was a very pious and zealous member of Judaism. In his zeal he lead the effort to stamp out the sect of believers in Christ. Jesus, the object of Saul's persecution, became Jesus, the center of Paul's faith. Paul was changed from his work of climbing the social ladder, to working as a missionary to the Gentiles.

GRADUAL—Matthew 28:7; Hebrews 2:7, Psalm 8:6

This is is a statement of the Resurrection followed by the glory and honor given to Christ by our Father.

EPISTLE LESSON—Revelation 5:1-14

The theme that predominates this lesson, is that of the slain Lamb sitting on the throne ruling over all and receiving glory and honor from creation. We see the Lamb taking His rightful place on the throne. We also hear of His Second coming. Note that the circle of those who are sitting around the throne is growing. The scroll was about to be opened. Much praise is being given to Jesus in this little reading, because we have grateful hearts for His work to bring us into fellowship with God, and put us in the place of salvation. We gratefully work for Him, as our response.

GOSPEL LESSON—John 21:1-19

According to John, this was the third time Jesus had come to the Apostles. They were together, although not all together in this place. It is thought
