

## PRAYER OF THE CHURCH

**IF YOU HAVE EVER BEEN AT THE BEACH WHEN THE FOG ROLLED IN, YOU HAVE SOME IDEA OF THE WAY OUR SEASON OF LENT BUILDS TOWARD THE DAYS OF MAUNDY THURSDAY AND GOOD FRIDAY.** The Sundays of Lent are festival days. The members of the Early Church (who were in fast and denial for Lent) would wash their hands and faces for the Sunday worship. Even in this time of building toward His death on the cross, we are still aware that our Savior lives eternally for us. We thank everyone for coming to out to worship with us today. Worship is a social event in which we listen as God speaks and then we respond with the songs of His praise and glory for all He has so willingly done for us. All of His work is done out of purely Fatherly goodness and mercy.

**THEME OF THE DAY:**

Repent and Believe

**INTROIT**—(Antiphon: Psalm 25:6;) Psalm 115:11-13, 18

The only historic connection in or lessons today is the one verse from Psalm 25. Everything else was new with the three year cycle. Psalm 25 was written by David. It is considered to be a Psalm of faith. The church has used this Psalm on the Second Sunday in Lent from our historic beginning. Psalm 115 is a Psalm of general thanksgiving. The section we have chosen is a series of blessings we receive from God.

**COLLECT**

Sin hurts, body and soul. We pray that God would keep us from the harms inflicted by sin.

**OLD TESTAMENT LESSON**—Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

We changed our Old Testament Lesson (from Genesis 28 the history of Issac) to these verses from chapter 17 in our most recent cycle Now, we go backward and are introduced to Abraham, and Sarah. Sort of a prequel to last weeks lesson.

**GRADUAL**—Hebrews 12:2

Hebrews chapter 12 compares the greater wonder of Heaven to the lesser wonder of our place here on Earth, and encourages us to look to Jesus for patience and perseverance.

**EPISTLE LESSON**—Romans 5:1-11

Our justification necessarily involves our reconciliation. This is important because between a human judge and an accused person there is not necessarily anything personal. The relationship between God and the sinner is not just a legal one; it is also very personal. Paul tells us that those God has declared to be "just," (righteous) are those whom God calls, "friend." The suffering we endure is given meaning because of the suffering of Christ. We are enabled to rejoice in our suffering because Jesus came into the world and took up our sin, suffering the punishment from God for the separation. Nothing we will suffer even approaches Jesus' great act, (we suffer in the face of our sin.) We will never suffer the ultimate consequence of eternal death in Hell, because we, in Jesus, have been made friends with God.

**VERSE**—Mark 8:34b

**GOSPEL LESSON**—Mark 8:27-38
