GOSPEL LESSON—John 6:22-35

Three words are emphasized in this lesson; "bread, work and life." These three words are keys to the text. The crowds who found Jesus at Capernaum inquired about His arrival. Jesus came right to the point. They had not come to observe signs, they had not come to worship Him as God, they had come because of bread, they were fed and happy. Jesus told them not to work so hard for food that rots. Work hard for food that endures to eternal life, and eternal life is only to be found through faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. He is the bread from Heaven. He is the meal of the covenant. He is the assurance of eternal life.

PRAYER OF THE CHURCH

THEME OF THE DAY:

Food Of Eternal Life

INTROIT—(Antiphon: Psalm 78:72;) Psalm 78:23-25

There is nothing historic about our lessons today. The Old Testament, Epistle and Gospel lessons were added to our lectionary in the first revision to a three year cycle in about 1969. Today, we, in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, are using the alternative Introit which was introduced in the revision to the revised lectionary in 1992, but which we didn't start using until 2006. We are using the alternate because it accords with the Old Testament and Gospel Lessons. The title of Psalm 78 tells us that it is a work of Asaph. In the book of First Chronicles (25:1-2) the sons of Asaph were assigned by David to prophesy, "with lyres, with harps, and with cymbals." (The Psalms were set to music, but we don't know the sound.) Jesus is our Shepherd, Jesus is our Bread of Life.

COLLECT

Jesus wasn't referring to the sacrament when He called himself the "Bread of Life." In this prayer we ask to be nourished in the fact that He is "the Word" and we are fed in Him to Eternal Life.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON—Exodus 16:2-15

God provided the Israelites with all that they needed to support their bodies and lives. The manna and quail are bread from Heaven. They were to collect the manna and quail daily. Day-to-day they were to live from the hand of God. God led the Israelites to depend on His provision. The Exodus was not a one time event. The people needed to learn to lean on God for all of their days, just as we need to lean on God for our daily life. We pray "give us this day our daily bread," in the same way the Israelites daily gathered the manna and quail.

GRADUAL—Romans 11:33, 36

This is our last Sunday with this Gradual. The connection to our theme for today is wisdom and knowledge. There is treasure in the life knowledge of God, the knowledge of God comes only through the work of Jesus who brought us out of war into the peace and plenty of life in God.

EPISTLE LESSON—Ephesians 4:1-16

Chapter 4 begins the second part of Ephesians with the theme that we should be worthy of God's call to salvation. Paul was actually in prison and he referred to himself as, "prisoner for the Lord." Essentially Paul is telling us to find where we are in life and figure out a way to honor God in that situation. In Paul's case this meant that he wrote letters that have become seminal treatise for comprehending subjective and objective justification. Stop being children. Present yourself as a grown up Christian equipped to build up the body of Christ in love.
