to be our path to salvation. Peter expressed the thought that we can master our own way into Heaven, we can command Heaven from our own desire and wish. Jesus explained that not only is the life of the Christ demanded by God as sufficient payment for the sins of the world, but to follow in the footsteps of the Christ will mean that we must give up our personal will and desire to take up the will and desire of God. It is possible for a person to, "gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul," by attempting to insert their will in the place of the will of God. We might end up as Jeremiah, an outcast among our own people, but the gift of eternal life is worth any minute of suffering today.

HERB MILLER, WRITING FOR THE PARISH PAPER, DESCRIBED THE FOLLOWING AS HOW PEOPLE FIND THEMSELVES GROWING SPIRITUALLY. People grow when they are involved in: (1) Worship, (2) Prayer, (3) Bible Study, (4) fellowship with other Christians, and (5) caring service to others. Mr. Miller indicates that 95% of Christians identify 1, 4 and 5 as important but leave out 2 and 3. "Prayer and Bible Study", (beyond the worship time) "offer a spiritual reference point for people, one that modifies their lives in God's direction." Personal Bible Study and prayer time are significant and important parts of a day. Corporate Bible Study and worship allow for the asking of questions and interaction (fellowship) in the Word.

THEME OF THE DAY:

Take Up Your Cross

INTROIT—(Antiphon: Psalm 37:4;) Psalm 37:5-7

Psalm 37 is a Maschil, (a teaching song.) It was written by King David to explain how to live, when life looks the darkest. Trusting in the Law of God, and fulfilling that trust, will ensure that we have a life worthy of God. For all the work God did to bring us to Salvation, it is a simple thing to give Him the glory and sing His praise. Singing this song encourages us to leave ourselves and trust in God.

COLLECT

Courage is a difficult thing. We ask God to give us the courage to follow Jesus no matter what it meas in terms of daily carrying our cross.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON—Jeremiah 15:15-21

The people of Israel were listening to false prophets. The actual news from the faithful prophets was so bad concerning the pending destruction that is was almost understandable that they would want to listen to the false prophets. Jeremiah was very unhappy with his position as the bearer of bad news in the face of the good news being proclaimed by the others. Jeremiah pledged his allegiance to God even in the face of his loneliness. He was a social outcast and persecuted because of the message he delivered. In it all, Jeremiah proclaimed the Word of God as the food of his life. The will of God was the joy of his heart. For his faithfulness God promised that he would not be overcome by the people. God would rescue Jeremiah for his selflessness.

GRADUAL—Psalm 34:9, 19 alternative

We continue with Psalm 34:9 and 19 to remind ourselves of fearless faith which comes to us in the power of Jesus, Who established the church as His personal possession for selfless service.

EPISTLE LESSON—Romans 12:9-21

Christians are to serve God, which means to serve one another as Christ came not to be served but to give His life as a sacrifice for the many. A living sacrifice is an oxymoron. Sacrifice implies death, the shedding of blood. Yet in our Baptism we became a "living sacrifice," as we died to sin and were raised to life in Jesus. Paul tells us to look to our faith as the measure of our worth.

GOSPEL LESSON—Matthew 16:21-26

In the first part of Matthew 16, Peter makes the unselfish proclamation that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God. When Jesus began to explain His need to give up His life as the sacrifice for the sins of the world, Peter proclaimed (what the world hopes) that we don't need Jesus
