

## GOSPEL LESSON—Mark 10:17-22

We often mistakenly think that the one with the most stuff is the most blessed by God. This is called: "theology of glory." But very often your stuff, will get in the way of your relationship with God. A young man, who had trust in God based on his stuff, attempted to clarify from Jesus that he was in fact, righteous. Jesus reminded the man, that as believers, we are only managers not owners of our stuff. The young man should have freed himself of the burden of management and followed Jesus. Sadly, the young man's sin stood in the way of true righteousness. His theology of glory conflicted with trusting only in Jesus as the source of his salvation. This ties in nicely with Amos and Hebrews. Give up your sinful ways and follow after Jesus for salvation.

**ENTRANCE PRAYER:** O Lord God, shepherd of our souls and supplier of all our needs, we, the people of Your pasture, come before You with hearts filled with gratitude and praise. **AFTER THE HARVEST COMES THE HARVEST FESTIVAL (the Octoberfest.)** Some people in this vast country of ours are getting ready for winter. The farming communities are bringing in the harvest, anticipating the time when nothing grows. We approach the end of our Church Year, and we are reminded that the end of all time is drawing near. There is a harvest of souls who need the message of the Gospel. Be a worker in the harvest. #### **THEME OF THE DAY**

Following Jesus

**INTROIT**—(Antiphon: Psalm 112:1;) Psalm 112:3-6

Psalm 112 is an acrostic poem (each line begins with the successive letter of the Hebrew alphabet.) It, along with 111 and 113 are titled, "Hallelujah," (translated that is, "Praise the Lord.") Psalm 112 comments on the last verse of Psalm 111, we gain our wisdom from our love of God. The verses chosen speak of (1) righteousness, (3) prosperity, (4) comfort, (5) wisdom, and (6) honor. We don't use the verses that speak of the misery of the wicked. "Following Jesus is righteousness," is in today's theme.

#### **COLLECT**

This Collect, written for our 2006 revision to the Propers, sounds a bit like the historic Collect for Trinity 16. It fits our lessons in that we ask God to insure that we don't trust in our built up earthly treasure for our future, but in fact rely on Jesus Christ and His life as our assurance.

**OLD TESTAMENT LESSON**—Amos 5:6-7, 10-15

Amos lived during the history recorded in 2 Kings 14–15/2 Chronicles 26. Though he was of the tribe of Judah, he did his work among the Northern areas (Bethel.) God sent Amos to warn the 10 Northern Tribes that they were falling into apostasy. He was opposed in his work by Amaziah the priest of Bethel. In this section he reminded the people of the enormity of the power of God, in that He made the stars, and then Amos, enumerated their many sins. This message from God ends with the exhortation to: "hate evil, and love good," These people had forgotten the God of their fathers and would eventually be abandoned by God for their unbelief.

**GRADUAL**—Psalm 91:11, 103:1

Both of these Psalms were written by David. The use of the Gradual, follows an ancient pattern which changes with the festival. This week our Gradual complements the, "Following Jesus, theme in that we bless His Holy name for the work of our salvation. We have one more week for these two verses before we move on.

**EPISTLE LESSON**—Hebrews 3:12-19

I am convinced that the book of Hebrews was written by Luke, the same man who wrote Luke's Gospel and the book of Acts. While I am in good company among the commentators with this understanding, I lack the credentials to assert it as fact. The Epistle lessons tend to have a life of their own among the readings. From Proper 22 through 28 we read from the book of Hebrews. Today, the Epistle Lesson is very much like the lesson from Amos. The NIV even titles this, "Warning Against Unbelief." The author is speaking of the Israelites in the wilderness but it still fits nicely to the theme of, "Following Jesus."
