GOSPEL LESSON—Mark 12:28-37

First of all, how pathetic is it that the Scribes and the Pharisees thought that they should debate with Jesus over the meaning of Scripture. Here they had the author in their midst and they considered themselves to be smarter than the One Who wrote the book. So the challenge is given, "which Commandment is the most important?" It is very likely the man wanted to be able to launch into a debate with Jesus over which of the 10 is the most important. The answer from Jesus, (as we see from the Old Testament Lesson,) speaks to the must more involved message of the Commandments. There is only One God and you are to love God with all your heart and soul. That is the "most important" commandment because that speaks to knowledge and faith.

The truth is that we are always end time Christians because Jesus fulfilled all the prophecies concerning the end of the world. Now we are simply living out the end times waiting for Jesus to return. The best news is that God is patiently waiting for the end. In that way, all of those whom He has chosen for salvation will be born and received through the water and Word of Baptism.

THEME OF THE DAY:

Love God

INTROIT—(Antiphon, Psalm 9:1;) Psalm 89:1-4

In Psalm 9 David was praising God for his personal victories and for the victories God allowed the nation to achieve. The title of Psalm 89 states that it is a "miskel of Ethan," who was alive during the time of Solomon, that may only mean that it is set to chords of music he had previously written. The events in this Psalm accord better to the time of Jeremiah. Verses 1-2 are a general opening line of praise to God. Verses 3-4 speak of the promise of Christ as son of David.

COLLECT

We are looking to Jesus. As our High Priest He made the perfect sacrifice for our sin with His shed blood. We ask to worship Him in purity and truth.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON—Deuteronomy 6:1-9

Many commentators place verses 1-3 as the end of the presentation of the 10 Commandments and consider verses 4-9 as an exposition of the First Commandment. Deuteronomy 6 goes quite nicely with the Gospel Lesson and gives us the setting for the answer from Jesus. Today we are getting ready for the last three Sundays of the Church year. We do this mainly by reminding ourselves of Whom we worship and what it is we are expecting through our faith. We worship the One God in Three persons of Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and we anticipate salvation through the shed blood of Jesus Christ, the Son, our Lord.

GRADUAL—Revelation 7:14b; Psalm 84:5

Those who have come out of the tribulation of this world are those who have been given faith. These people praise God for all they have been given. Revelation 7 tells us the number of the saved. As such it is of great encouragement. Psalm 84, by the Sons of Korah was written for worship. Our faith is the highway that has been laid out in our heart to take us to Heaven.

EPISTLE LESSON—Hebrews 9:11-22

Hebrews 9 is at least as complex as it seems. When Jesus appeared at the Jordan River He established Himself as the place we would find God (taking the place of the Temple.) Jesus used His body as the place to make a sacrifice for sins and He used His body as the sacrifice (because bulls and goats were only symbols of the blood He would shed.) Our faith, granted to us by the Holy Spirit, gives us the work of Christ as our own and we are raised from the dead (and the works of the dead, that is sin) and established as those who are made worthy to serve God (that is, we have Heaven and eternal life guaranteed to us in the wonder of our faith.)
