Zaccheus was a Jew. However, he was collecting taxes for the Romans and therefore was something of an outcast from among the Jews. The commentator, Matthew Henry said, "God has his remnant among all sorts. Christ came to save even the chief of publicans." There are two really fun things about this account. 1 Jesus had just finished telling the parable of the tax collector (Luke 18:9-14) and 2 Jesus had just finished saying how difficult it is for the rich to enter the kingdom (Luke 18:24-25.) Zaccheus was the embodiment of these two and yet, because of his faith, Jesus declares him to be a "son of Abraham."

PRAYER OF THE CHURCH

P O Almighty God, You say, through Your Beloved Son: Blessèd are those who hear God's Word. O merciful and Eternal God, it would be better for us gladly to call You blessèd and to praise and thank You for having made Yourself known to us sinners in such a friendly and Fatherly way. Hear us as we bring to You our private petitions. (Time of silent prayer.) May we realize Your presence among us as Your Love draws us ever closer to our heavenly home.

DOUG WAS VERY CONCERNED. Through no effort on his part he had become very wealthy. Doug had a talent as a photographer. His work was used bringing in residuals as his photos were used on magazine covers. Doug was worried because he wanted to go to Heaven. He had taken the warning of Luke 18 to mean that the wealthy were somehow excluded from Heaven. To God's credit I had just moments before been reading the account of Zaccheus. We chatted about how difficult it was for the wealthy to believe in anything but their wealth, as in the account of the "Rich Fool." (Luke 12) However Zaccheus shows that, even if wealth is a stumbling block, it is faith that saves. Dave Ramsey often points out that the advantage of wealth is the ability to be a generous giver.

THEME OF THE DAY:

Sacrifice of Thanksgiving

INTROIT—(Antiphon, Psalm 50:23;) Psalm 50:1-2, 14-15

This is titled, "A psalm of Asaph." We know that all the Psalms were set to music. We do not know what instruments were played or the sound of the music. Asaph set David's Psalms to music. In this case it is thought that Asaph, himself, wrote Psalm 50. This is a statement of instruction. It is never enough to believe that we are righteous because of our works. It is the work of Jesus and our faith in Him that redeems us.

COLLECT

In our prayer we ask to be, "stirred up," that is emotionally aroused to live our lives in holiness, here, that our bodies would be the place (the new Temple,) where our Christ will dwell.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON—Isaiah 1:10-18

Wow! This is the first time that any part of Isaiah chapter 1 have been used in worship and perhaps you can see why. God calls the Chosen People citizens of Sodom and Gomorrah (two places that were destroyed by God for their lack of faith. Isaiah was sent to a people who had dumped the One True God and were beginning to worship other gods with holy days in an attempt to blend in with their neighbors. God was obviously not happy with them. These people continued to assume that they were safe because they were Abraham's children. They had died to their faith and were in need of being stirred up.

GRADUAL—Revelation 7:14b; Psalm 84:5

Those who have come out of the tribulation of this world are those who have been given faith. These people praise God for all they have been given. Revelation 7 tells us the number of the saved. As such it is of great encouragement. Psalm 84, by the Sons of Korah was written for worship. Our faith is the highway that has been laid out in our heart to take us to Heaven.

EPISTLE LESSON—2 Thessalonians 1:1-12

This is the exact opposite of our Old Testament Lesson. Paul was commending and encouraging the congregations of Thessalonia in the wonder faith in Jesus. These were Christians, some of whom were giving up everything for their faith. Paul does get a little graphic (apocalyptic) in his description of the destruction God would unleash on those who persecuted the faithful.

GOSPEL LESSON—Luke 19:1-10

The account of Zaccheus is only mentioned here in the Gospel of Luke. As a curiosity, his name in Greek translates as "pure" or "innocent."
