was a Gentile. (On that issue, this account connects to the healing of the Centurions servant.) Jesus has the authority of God to heal disease, and as God, He has the authority to give life to whom He pleases. Unlike Elijah, Jesus did this work on His own effort and work. Jesus showered His compassion on the widow. Jesus as the Only Begotten Son of God would die. The Only Begotten Son of His Father would raise Himself from the dead, after completing the work of the reconciliation of our flesh to God our Father. (It is interesting that the people would recognize, "God has come to help his people!" Since this is alike to what is declared of Paul and Barnabas in Acts 14.)

P Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. You have ordained that the whole family in Heaven and on Earth is named after Him. We worship You for Your manifold wisdom, Your mighty works, and Your perfect holiness. We especially praise You for our reconciliation to You through the sufferings and death of Your Son. We through faith in Him enter with confidence into Your presence and bring to You our prayers and petitions.

Give a special measure of Your power to those who are in sorrow or mourning, to those who are in pain or sickness, to those who may be in temptation or peril, that they may receive Your blessèd aid and be delivered from every danger.

Hear us as we bring to You our private petitions. (Time of silent prayer.) These things and whatever else we should have asked of You but did not, we raise before You, O God, through our Redeemer and Lord Jesus Christ. © Amen.

THEME OF THE DAY:

Calling On God

INTROIT—(Antiphon, Psalm 86:16;) Psalm 138:3, 7-8

Psalm 86 is considered to be a general prayer of David's. It teaches us to lift up our hearts to God. Psalm 138 (for the first time in our reading cycle,) is a general Psalm of David. In it he establishes our theme for today, that of calling out to God and then being healed by Him.

COLLECT

We call on God to be with us in all things, that we can fulfill His will.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON—1 Kings 17:17-24

Elijah was given the authority to accomplish miraculous acts. He was cared for by ravens and eventually a (Gentile) widow. The widow had worked to avoiding the attention of a god whom she thought would punish her. She believed that Elijah had brought her to the attention of God, and that God had killed her son. In what can only be accredited to Elijah being a forerunner (and type) of Christ, the boy was given back his life. Elijah took the boy up to his room prayed and threw himself on the lifeless body. This was an act of exchange. Elijah was offering his life in exchange for the boy. God did not require the exchange from Elijah, but God made Jesus exchange His life for ours.

GRADUAL—Romans 10:8b, 10

Today we add the second part of verse 8 to the second half of the Gradual for Pentecost (verse 10,) and we comment on the work of the Holy Spirit. He put the Word in our heart and head and made it possible for us to proclaim our faith.

EPISTLE LESSON—Galatians 1:11-24

Paul was not an Apostle because of the work of any man. He was an Apostle because of the miraculous intervention of Jesus, accomplished after His Ascension. In his former life, Paul was worthless to God, or even worse, Paul was a part of the persecution of Christians. The change came with the direct Revelation of Jesus, and put Paul into the position of Apostle in the same way as any of the Twelve. Paul was the last addition to keep the number at Twelve and would have replaced James after he was martyred. (Through Paul's conversion, God proclaimed His ability to change the hearts and lives of those whom He desires. Through the work and person of Jesus Christ our Savior, God will take us out of our dead sins and make us over into the people useful to His kingdom.

GOSPEL LESSON—Luke 7:11-17

This Gospel Lesson causes a lot of controversy, including an argument over the nationality of the widow of Nain. I side with those who say she
